DESIGN YOUR OWN FAMILY CREST

WITH THE SCHOOL OF AFRICAN CULTURES

Start this activity by having a chat about where in the world some of your ancestors may have come from. Think about that place and the journey to where you are now.


What images spring to mind when you think of your ancestor's birthplace?

Remember to ask others about their family journeys, you may be surprised at what you hear...!


